Now as I have mentioned development role, Interlopers have been making funding applications to assist in taking on our own **Club Development officer** to work around and developing on from the WOC 2024 itself. The initial plan is to try to find a suitable candidate who could work with the club on a number of development ideas, with initial thinking being around the equivalent of one day a week although we are taking advice from other Clubs, SOA and the Orienteering Foundation with regard to the post and work is currently in progress on the details and funding. The post will be paid by a combination of Club funds and grants that we may receive and there is any number of projects we will be keen to explore.

As I type this piece, we have just returned from **JK2024** and may I offer my congratulations specifically to **Luke Fisher** who won the Long Race, and **Peter Hodgkinson** who won the Sprint in M21E. **Lucy Ward** won both the Sprint and Middle at W14A narrowly missing out on the overall. In the relays it was great to have so many teams with the **Men's Open** securing second and third, and **Women's Open** making fourth.

Looking ahead we have a **Sprintelope** series upon us again - please consider offering to help make this happen, and we have a couple of other local events we need to get helpers for. I am sure you have seen the emails, please say if you can help to ensure we can make these events happen.

JK 2024 – Lorna Eades

Nearly forty members of Interlopers made the journey down to this year's JK Easter orienteering festival. This was held in the Midlands with the Sprint at Loughborough University, Day 2&3 on Beaudesert, Cannock Chase and the relay at Stan ton Moor, near Matlock. Weather was a mixed bag throughout the weekend with the best of the days being the Friday Sprint event with a fine sunny spring day (with occasional intense showers).



The Loughborough campus provided some tricky courses for the opening day. Podium performances for the Sprint came from **Lucy Ward** (W12) with an impressive 2 min Gold medal win over the rest of the field, **Laurence Ward** (M18E), bronze, **Peter Hodkinson** Gold and **Freddie Carcas** Bronze in M21E.

Day 2 Middle: 'Well that was muddy' was the theme of the day (and the following day only longer in it). Many a tale of falling headlong or knee deep in wallowing marsh/mud pits. Sadly a couple of misplaced controls rendered the M21 and W21 elite classes void. Top performers on the day were **Innes Chepelin** 11th (M12) **Laurence Ward** 6th (M18E), **Laura Kitchin** 2nd (W12), **Lucy Ward** 1st (W14), **Bethan Kitchin** 13th (W16), **Claire Ward** (W45L) 2nd and **Heather Hartman** (W50L) 8th.

Day 3 Long: More of the same mud...only much longer fun out in it. Top individual performances: **Innes Chepelin** 5th (M12) **Laurence Ward** 5th (M18E), **Luke Fisher** (M21E1) 1st, **Freddie Carcas** (M21E1) 10th, **Laura Kitchin** 2nd (W12), **Lucy Ward** 2nd (W14), **Mairi Eades** (W21E) 7th, **Aoife McCavana** (W21E) 14th, **Claire Ward** (W45L) 4th, **Kate Kitchin** (W45S) 5th, **Heather Hartman** (W50L) 6th and **Jane Carcas** (W55S) 3rd.

Overall from Day 2&3 combined: Innes Chepelin 10th (M12) Laurence 5th (M18E), Laura Kitchin Silver (W12), Lucy Ward Silver (W14), Bethan Kitchin 13th (W 16), Claire Ward (W45L) Bronze and Heather Hartman (W50L) 5th and Kate Kitchin (W45S) 6th. (M/W21E same as Day 3.)





For the Relay, a shift northwards to Stanton Moor in the Peak District near Matlock and a change in terrain to rocky tors and a lot less mud. Interlopers fielded three strong teams in the Men's and 2 in the Women's premier class, Women's short, Men's 165+, W48- and mixed ad hoc so a great spread across the age classes. As defending Men's premier champions, stakes were high to make the first team, but could we go for more than one team on the podium?

Men's premier was first off, Eddie Narbett returning in 2nd place, Aidan Smith in 7th and Freddie in 8th. Leg 2 saw positions changing around with James Ackland droppi ng 1 place but sending Sasha out in 3rd along with Peter Hodkinson after Luke Fisher pulled the 2nd team up into 4th to hunt down FVO and EUOC. By the spectator control both had reeled in Euan Tryner from EUOC but Peter Molloy remained tantalising 20-30 seconds ahead. After a very tight final loop all 4 teams finished within 30s with Interlopers in 2nd and 3rd for the podium. Our 3rd team of Aiden, Ben Stevens and Colm Moran finished a respectable 12th.





Next up the Women's premier with 2 teams on the start line for the first time in several years which was fab to see. First leg saw **Jura MacMillan** and **Pippa Carcas** return in 7th and 8th respectively. **Aiofe McCavana** and **Roanne Lilley** pulled up places to bring the teams up to 4th and 5 respectively and into contention for a podium should SYO's second team falter. Final leg saw **Mairi Eades** and **Louise Adams** gain on 3rd place but not quite enough to gain a position on the podium, however **finishing 4th and 6th team** respectively and marking a fantastic return to the top end of the Women's premier class.

Our Women's short team of **Claire Ward**, **Jane Carcas and Heather Hartman** finished 7th. Mens 165+ (**Colin Eades, Max Carcas and Andy Kitchin**) 18th, Junior Intermediate women-48 (**Bethan Kitchin, Laura Kitchin and Lucy Ward**) 7th and our final team running in the mixed adhoc (**Graham McIntyre, Joy Hodkinson and Mo McIntyre**) 13th.

Big Weekend - William Ivory

In the run-up to WOC 2024 (Edinburgh, July), the Big Weekend races this year were all urban in nature. There was a training camp in the week leading up to the event, with the first events on Friday 26th January (2x2 mixed-sprint relay and Fight With the Night), followed by a Sprint on Saturday and longer Urban course on Sunday.



2x2 MSR (Mixed Sprint Relay) - Liberton, Friday

A new event, aimed at the Elite runners, this took place in Liberton on Friday afternoon. The format was 4 legs, M-W-M-W, around the intricate housing estate layout with plenty of steps, narrow passageways and sharp turns to keep everyone on their toes. Several Interlopers in action:

Fight With The Night (FWTN) - The Inch, Friday

Back to more traditional fare, the FWTN race was based just across the road from the 2x2 MSR at the Inch Community Sports Centre. It was a dry night, not too cold, perfect for running around the twists and turns of the Inch estate. Some good results for the club, and for those on the longer courses, a possible chance to claim they raced against someone famous (well, in Orienteering circles at least).

Sprint - South Queensferry, Saturday

This year's Saturday was a sprint rather than long urban, with the elite classes being World Ranking Events (WRE). This involved a lot of extra work for EUOC as it was effectively parallel events, and Fiona Eades and Jim Bailey had their hands full organising it. Many club members helped out, and I had a stint on quarantine, mostly writing signs and taking participants' bags from the quarantine exit along to the finish for collection. Perhaps someone can explain to me why elite orienteers want to warm up in a different pair of shoes to the ones they race in?

Anyway, despite part of South Queensferry being very definitely on a steep slope down to the Forth, the actual courses were almost flat, around the housing estates at the top of the hill. Quite a few artificial barriers added to the challenge of some very good courses. Those in the top half of their course included:

Sunday's race was a long urban at Bughtlin in West Edinburgh, in place of the usual trot around Arthur's Seat (if you missed that, check out the WOC tour warmup race being planned by Max Carcas). Artificial barriers again added to the challenge, as did having the straight line route from 5 to 6 on my course pass through 9, especially when you consider that the map was upside down at this point leading to 9 looking more like 6 than 6 did. Oh, did I mention the profusion of artificial barriers around this point too? All good fun anyway, with some interesting longer route choice decisions as well. The 2024 SoSOL (South of Scotland Orienteering League) got off to a great start on 10 March in Dalkeith Country Park, with **Interlopers winning 5 out of 8 courses**, and taking the top 2 positions in the 3 longest courses (brown, blue and green). ESOC were hosting the first round, and while it may have been overcast, the rain mostly held off. Courses were fast and furious as the park offers very fast running with very little ascent, and the winner on the brown course must have gone round at a pace of 4 minutes / km or thereabouts! Meanwhile **Inis Chepelin** seems to have been busy having come first on both orange and light green ...

A Local-Event Planning Debut – Joe Hudd (EUOC)

Having done lots of running in south Edinburgh – I assumed I knew the area well. Once I started planning, however, I realised how many sections of Mortonhall I had run through without really thinking about how it could be used for Orienteering.

Once the start and finish locations had been sorted out, I opened the map file in condes and began experimenting. I had a look at some previous courses on the area for some inspiration. I specifically wanted to make sure that I provided some interesting legs for Orienteers of all abilities and – moreover - to access parts of the areas which were used less frequently.

After receiving some feedback on my first drafts from William, I realised I needed to reevaluate the kinds of roads which younger juniors were allowed to cross unsupervised. As such, I decided to use a different section of the area in order to make the Yellow and Orange courses interesting without crossing any dangerous roads. I added a butterfly loop to the Light-Green course in an effort to get the most out of the best section of the area.


Once I had created some interesting courses in Condes, I printed off a copy and incorporated them into my longer running route. I was quite happy with the courses but decided that a few things needed to be changed. I edited a few control placements to ensure that flags would be (un)obvious from nearby paths and to make sure that SI boxes could be readily grippled to nearby objects.

Many thanks to William for his helpful support and advice when planning. I hope to use what I have learnt in my future planning endeavours.

Winterlope 2021-24s ... RIP? GRAEME ACKLAND





A team of eager planners (**Graeme, Pat, Bex** and the ghost of Graeme past) are recruited. Mapping a new course at Portobello is in train. Everything is ready, until... The committee calleth. A cull of Winterlopes has been approved. Resources are scarce, and Winterlopes are too dear.

In the end it was all sorted out, we had a four race series on Prestonpans, Braids (thank you Bex) Musselburgh and Liberton (thank you Pat). These were combined with EUOC's Fight with the Night and scored up on Ben Browns Munro Leagues. **Ann Haley** won a narrow victory on the short course score of 580 over **Tricia Alston'**s 576. ESOC's Terry Johnstone took a convincing win on the long course.

It may be time now to review whether we need to run the Winterlopes every year. As a lockdown activity, they came into their own using Maprun and running alone. Now it's clear that the FWTN format is the more attractive option, but our club doesn't have the volunteers for the events we do do, let alone four more.

We do now have a bank of Maprun courses, which we could simply recycle year on year. The style of orienteering is mainly point and shoot on a bearing, so rerunning the courses doesn't matter so much.

Maximus Orienteering Meeting 2024 Pat Bartlett



Myself and Su joined a number of JOK members (ex Oxford University Orienteering Club) for a trip to the MOM in February.

MOM is organised by the Maximus Orienteering Club, who are based in the Avila province in Spain, which is about 2 hours west of Madrid. Similarly to the POM (the Portugal O Meeting), the event is organised in February each year to provide some (relatively!) warm weather orienteering/training.

MOM attracts a large number of elite orienteers – as well as the event there are also a large number of high quality training opportunities – but also has a good field for other classes (e.g. c100 on M55). It is handy from Edinburgh due to the EasyJet direct flights to Madrid!


We flew out on the Thursday staying in a villa in the town of Navaluenga. Friday was a tricky training day before a long race on the Saturday, middle distance race on the Sunday, a sprint on the Monday, and a classic distance chasing start (which we weren't able to stay for) on the Tuesday. Weather was great – after having to scrape ice off the car in the morning, sun cream was needed in the assembly areas.



The Saturday long race was a nice white forest – fast going with lots of contour detail, I was happy to manage c9minute k's.

The Sunday middle race was next to the training area, and we knew this was going to be highly technical and physical with a lot of rock detail. This complex rock terrain is characteristic of the area (and also featured in the Tuesday chasing start event). M55 was 3.2k, shown below.

Control 10 was my (and many others) downfall. I was in the vicinity but (I think!) too high and it was very difficult to relocate resulting in a 10 minute error!

The Monday saw an excellent urban sprint race in the hill down of Navarredondilla. We don't often seem to have sprint races for M55s (i.e. winning time of 12 minutes, M55 was 2.2k), and the area was a highly confusing maze when trying to move quickly. The grey is bare rock (with cliffs) between certain buildings. Very enjoyable.



Riviera Sprint Camp – France/Italy (March 2024)

Four Interlopers recently attended a GB sprint camp along with teams from Finland, Norway and France. The camp was organised by the king himself (Thierry Gueorgiou), so we knew it was gonna be a good trip. We started out in Italy near San Remo and got thrown straight into the deep end. Me and **Pippa** [Carcas] had been lulled into a false sense of security from the BUCS sprint relay the previous day in the flat and blocky Cambridge (shout out to me and Pippa for finishing 1st & 2nd on the women's first leg, cheers for planning the courses **Murray** and **Tessa** [Strain]). But back to Italy which in the details Thierry claimed these areas would be the hardest orienteering we would experience in our elite careers...

Narrow passages, tunnels, steep hills, stairs, cobbled streets, all very tricky indeed. Some passageways were so long and dark head torches were recommended. By the afternoon the rain had arrived adding to the treacherousness of it all so we tested running a full day sprint with our head torches on (a very strange feeling but what an experience).

The Italian terrains continued to provide tricky terrains but with many awesome views of coasts and mountains. I had to rely on Pippa the photographer and content creator to capture these as my phone decided it would rather go back to Edinburgh than come on holiday \cong (so kudos to Pippa for all the pics).

We then made our way past Monaco on scenic walks and runs to see the views, then it was onto Nice for yet another very hilly sprint course but again such a novelty with the crazy terrain and this time views of the sea (some had a post run dip). Nice was indeed very nice.
