For those going abroad – enjoy the orienteering in the sun and the foreign 'O' experience.



EVENTS ROUND-UP

World School Orienteering Championships Ann Haley

Congratulation to lain Cackette, Stephen Haley, Shaun Rogerson and Stuart Watson for being selected to run for Scotland in the World Schools Orienteering Championships that were based in Edinburgh from the 21st – 26th April 2008. Twelve Scottish Schools were represented in this competition which had 485 competitors from 22 different countries.


After a practice event at Beecraigs, Linlithgow, all participants took part in an opening ceremony in the Scottish Parliament. Iain and Stephen were among the flag bearers for the International School Sport Federation.

The 'classic' event took place in Devilla, Kincardine. It was long and tough technically and underfoot, with wet conditions hindering progress and resulting in a massive range of times, with some being over 3 hours. All of the members of the Firrhill team did well to complete their 6.3km course. Somehow the competitors found plenty of energy for the disco in the evening. Thursday was the day of a cultural tour, and this was followed on Friday by a 'middle distance' race at Barr Wood, Stirling. This was a pleasant area with many features which aided navigation. Times were fast, and all 4 boys improved their positions. The results were dominated by the Swedes and the Latvians but Scotland did manage to gain a silver medal in the 1993/4 boys category represented by Aboyne Academy. The prize giving was followed by a cultural evening where all countries put on a short presentation and then displayed products from their country. Not surprisingly the Scottish stall had lots of shortbread, caramel wafers, tablet and irn bru on offer!

The final race was a friendship team event in Holyrood Park. Teams of three were made up of competitors from different countries. Each team had to visit a set of points in any order, plus 3 control points which had to be visited by the whole team at the same time, so encouraging collaboration between team members. This event had a mass start by the Palace, which made spectacular viewing with all the runners in their country colours going off in numerous directions all over The World Schools the park. website states "Last month, the same venue was used for the World Cross-country Championships but today, orienteering's kids showed what cross-country running really means." This event was a fantastic success.

The Scottish Parliament was the venue for the final prize giving and closing ceremony. All competitors then enjoyed a ceilidh at Meadowbank where the band was from Biggar High School.

This whole event proved to be a fantastic opportunity to experience International competition and comradeship. All the children enjoyed the experience and the Firrhill boys are grateful to the Edinburgh Education Endowment Fund for providing the fees for the event.





Scottish Schools Orienteering Festival Friday 5th June Drumpellier Park, Coatbridge Ann Haley

There was a bit of a build up to this event, with recruitment of team members and training sessions in Buckstone taking place. On the day, the sun shone and the Interlopers turned out in force

Fiona and Kirsty (only p4) Sutherland flew around the p5/6 girls course in 10 and 11 minutes respectively. Matthew and Samuel Galloway matched this by coming 1st and 4th with times of 7 and 9 minutes. With a speed of less than 5 mins per km, Matthew's time was particularly impressive. With a friend they took home the team prize for Buckstone. One of the Buckstone beginners won the p7 boys race and the p7 team took third position.

In the secondary races, it was Interlopers who dominated the S1 boys race with Mark Haley (Firrhill) coming 1st followed by Christopher Galloway (Boroughmmuir) coming 2nd. The Firrhill team of Mark Haley, Cameron Winterburn and Euan Geddes, plus 2 more friends, brought home the S1 boys team trophy. One of the Firrhill girls took third place in the S1 race and the girls team put in an outstanding performance to come 2nd.

Congratulations must also go to Stephen Haley for coming 3rd in the S5/6 race and to the S5 Firrhill team of lain Cackette, Stephen Haley, Shaun Rogerson and Stuart Watson who the won Scottish Schools Orienteering Championships for the 4th consecutive year.

The new permanent course at Braidburn Valley Park – inaugural event on 11 June 2008 Jane Ackland

James' schoolmate Rory has a very dynamic mum, Karen Young; the chairlady of Friends of Braidburn Valley Park. About three years ago, in a rash spare moment when she wasn't working or ferrying offspring around, she responded to a request from South Morningside Primary School. They use the Park for their cross-country runs, and thought some control posts might liven things up a bit. Sourcing posts, plaques, engravers, orange and white paint, and someone to plant the posts, and someone (Graeme) to update the map wasn't as easy as you might think, as evidenced by the 3 year time scale, but finally everything's up and running.

Needless to say we opted for the most unbelievably torrential evening of rain to cut the ribbon and declare the course officially open. Graeme had drawn up two courses, using half the controls each so that people could run a 2 x 1.6 km relay...or just find as many posts as the rain and their disintegrating maps permitted.

A big thank you to those soggy members of Interlopers who came to help run the event, explain how to orienteer, and swell the numbers of runners. I suppose I should single out Paul for particular attention. You'd think he'd jump at the opportunity to organise an event in the rain on his doorstep with only 24 hours to go before relinquishing his despotic presidency of our club, but he merely came to help, from start to dripping finish, in his suit and tie.

Scottish Sprint Championships (Stirling Old Town) 10th May 2008 Ken Daly

The map, course and atmosphere for the Scottish Sprint Championships were fantastic. Everyone shared the same 3 km course with 23 controls, which weaved its way through the old town, castle and church grounds, to make the race as challenging as any terrain orienteering.

Route choice and micro navigation were the keys to success. The spectator friendly finish and commentary provided great excitement as the close fought races enfolded.

The eventual winners were Ross McLennan and Douglas Tullie, equal in the mens open and Beccy Carlyle in the womens open. Everyone appeared to enjoy the occasion, although a wedding couple may not be too pleased when they notice a few sweaty runners in the background of their photos.

Congratulations also to the W40 team (Jane Ackland, Ann Haley, Lorna Eades) who came back 2nd.



GUEST COLUMN

Know Your Club Champion

I caught up with BEN HARTMAN recently to find out the secrets behind his biggest achievement to date - it's about time we got to know about the INT club champion and the hard work that went into making it all possible.

So Ben, how did you get into Orienteering?

My cross country teacher had been to JK84 in Wales and started taking a group of runners to local schools league events. A natural extension to XC training, but also a perfect excuse to miss Chapel on a Sunday.

Why do you carry on?

Maps, running and beautiful countryside – the perfect ingredients for a sport.

The challenge is intense – for your perfect run you have to run really fast and make no mistakes, constantly sifting all the information around you and making split-second decisions – terrain or track, over or round, speed up, slow down, rough or fine navigation, stick with or ignore other runners ...

Every race is different and after nearly 25 years I've plenty of room for improvement.

What is your favourite area and why?

Any good technical challenge that is not too physical. In recent years areas like Rogie, Cambus, Culbin, Achlean and Deishar fit the bill perfectly.

Abroad, the birch woods in the north of Norway are particularly enjoyable as are the endless runnable forests

in Australia with nothing but rocks and contours. And the sand dune forests in Portugal are a fantastic antidote to a wet and windy Scottish winter. (One of the clubs north of Lisbon, COC, puts on regular winter training camps, which made for a perfect family holiday this March.) from getting INT club Apart champion this year (and apparently in 2004 AND 2001!), what are your greatest achievements in 0?

Scottish team for last 5 years (Seniors 2003, Vets 2004)

With Interlopers, Compass Sport Cup champions 1996 and Scottish Relay Champions 1993

In terms of planning, BEOC middle 2000 at Loch Vaa, Day 5 at Arisaig (what a stunningly beautiful area!) for Lochaber 01.

In Cross Country, I used to be able to run fairly quickly, a highlight being helping Livingston (aka Interlopers AC) win the East District XC Champs at a very muddy Alloa in 1994.

What was your worst 'O' mistake?

On my first trip to Norway in 1988 I remember taking 45 minutes to find the control from an attack point on the edge of the circle.

At an early JK at Barns Cliff in Yorkshire I took over 2½ hours for the 7k M17 course (won by Jason Inman in about an hour I think).

I topped this at a particularly tough Scottish Champs at Dunalastair in 1995 where the M21E course took me over 2³/₄ hours. Hang on hasn't half the Dunalastair map been rebranded as Tullochroisk – venue of this year's Scottish Champs.

More recent mistakes are generally much smaller, but I tend not to run hard enough when I do know where I am and not to slow down enough when I don't.

Orienteering – better in the UK or abroad?

The best areas in Scotland or the Lakes are just about as good as it gets and the Scottish 6 Day is as good a multi-day as I've been to. But orienteering abroad presents the challenge of different and unfamiliar types of area and the opportunity to meet fellow orienteers from around the world.

SI or EMIT?

After the British at Culbin, don't ask!


